Do you like poetry? When I went to school we had to learn poems by heart and then recite them together as a class.

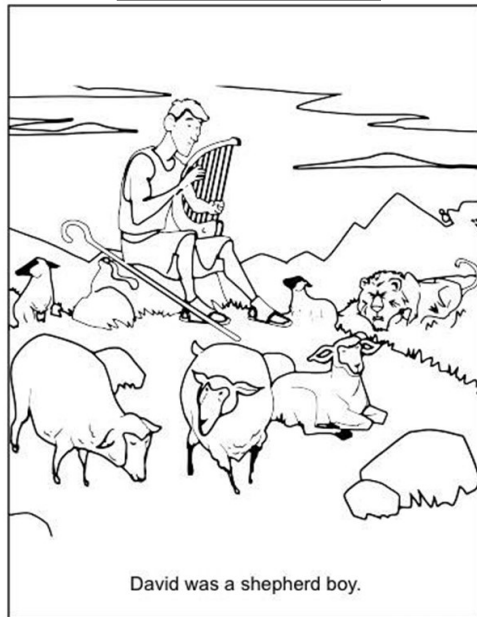

Are you dressed properly?



After the heated debate about religious clothing, does the Bible tell Christians what to wear?

There is actually nothing about monks or nun's habits in the Bible, nor any mention of ministerial dog-collars or clerical outfits.

The Apostle Peter does tell Christian women that their beauty should not come from fine clothes, but inner character instead (1 Peter 3 verse 4). But later in the same letter he gives instruction to all Christians in these words: "All of you, clothe yourselves with humility towards one another, because God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble" (1 Peter 5 verse 5).

Do you remember Tony Blair's mantra, "Education, Education, Education"? Well he

may have borrowed the format from Augustine, one of the great theologians of the early church, who said, "For those who would learn God's ways, humility is the first thing, humility is the second, humility is the third."

Sadly, too many of us are more likely to sing along with that 1980's hit, 'O Lord, it's hard to be humble when you're perfect in every way!'

As always, the Lord Jesus sets the standard. As the eternal Son of God he alone was perfect in every way and worthy of all honour and glory, yet "he humbled himself and became obedient to death – even death on a cross" (Philippians 2 verse 8).

It is only as we yield our lives to the Saviour who suffered a humiliating death for us that we can truly practise the virtue of humility.

How well do you know the Bible?

1. The Bible is divided into two parts the New Testament (NT) and the Old Testament (OT). True or False?
2. The NT was written to replace the OT. True or False?
3. The God described in the OT is different to the God described in the NT. True or False?
4. Jesus believed the OT. True or False?
5. The Bible is made up of 50 books written by many different people. True or False?
6. The central character of the Bible is Abraham, Moses, Elijah, or Jesus?

2. False - The Bible is one story of God's unfolding plan. The OT is the story of God's promise and the NT is the story of this promise being fulfilled. The Bible must be understood and read as one book.
3. False - God is the same throughout the whole of the Bible. He does not change. Both the OT and NT describe God as a "consuming fire" and also as a God of compassion.
4. True - There are over 100 quotations from the OT in the sayings of Jesus in Matthew, Mark, and Luke and 10% of all recorded words of Jesus are quotations from the OT.
5. False - The Bible contains 66 books written by some 40 human authors over a period of 1500 years. However, God the Holy Spirit so guided these writers that the Bible is also the word of God. So we could say that it is one book written by one author with one main subject.
6. Jesus is the central character of the Bible. The 4 gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John contain eye witness accounts of Jesus' life. And Jesus says of the OT scriptures "These are the Scriptures that testify about me". After his resurrection Jesus met two men walking to Emmaus and "Beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself".

Well, how did you score? Maybe you've never read the Bible as an adult. Why not start? John's gospel in the NT is a good place to begin. You could join us on a Sunday morning when Peter Rush explains the message of the Bible to us or do a 7-week Christianity Explored course, which takes you through the Gospel of Mark.



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
